1. THE OBJECTIVES OF THE HOUSE LAYOUT PROCESS
AND THE WAY TO ATTAIN THEM

One of the most fundamental features for the design process for the Israeli settlement was the layout process for the individual houses.

The objectives that we pursued through this process were the following: xx

- a. the settlement was to be made out of houses which would a express the individuality and uniqueness of the families in it.
- b. \*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\* all the houses of the settlement, at the same time, had to structure a coherent a unified whole in physical terms, which would reflect the strong community feeling present among the present amon
- of the settlement, both private and public, where they were going to live; they should start understanding and experiencing them from the early stages of the overall development process, so that they would realize that the making of the settlement into a lively and beautiful place, its continuous keeping was and necessary \*\*EXEXTENT\* repairs would be mainly their own responsibility, both individualy and collectively.
- the existing physical structure of the site, identified as and ascending-up-the-hill sequence of special and beautiful places formed around big trees, view points, and rock formation, had to be preserved and enhanced by the location of each individual house and by their clustering in groups around these places.

e. the process for the individual houses, itself, had to be economically efficient and operationally feasible, so that it could be applied in successfully in other housing projects.

In order to reach such a diversification of objectives we had a come up with a well-structured and thoroughly prexthought out process for the design of the five house clusters and the twenty houses comprised in them. The process that we decided to follow can be briefly described as such: each individual house was laid out on its actual site by the family who was going to live in it, on the basis of a specific set of rules developed by CES for this particular project.

Given the objectives it is clear why the families had to be deeply involved in the layout of their houses, as well as why the layout process of the house had to take place on its actual and probably on xxxxxxx a vague way, why why the set of site, What I want to i discuss more in detail is the necessity of the set of rules which were introduced as guidance for the layout process.

However, there is a set of points that I want to clarify, so that I make explicit all intentions and ways of pursuing the objectives.

- 2. The involvement of the families in the layout of their houses would fulfill, to some degree, the first and third objective.

  However, we knew that unless the families themselves were doing the layout of their houses texthexemaliestxdetxix on a detailed fashion, we would not be able to produce twenty different houses in which the variation is true and geniumexgenuine. Out, What I want to point at is that, it was clear that the variation and differentiation among the houses, laid out by the families, would be more real, straightforward and solid than if these twenty houses were to be designed or even laid out by us, with alw the clear intention to make each one of them reflect the uniqueness and individuality of each family.
- 3. The only case that we could have accomplished it would be if each one of the twenty houses was to be approached as a distinct different project, to be laid out and designed after lenghty discussions and collaboration with each family. Anyway, that was impossible, because of the limited amount of also time allotted to the completion of this specific task, and to the limited amount of money xxxxx specified in the contract xx which xxxx was compatible with the design of two or three different types of houses. Therefore, beyond the other advantages that the xxxxxx layout of the houses by the families offered, it an absolutely necessary component of this house layout was also necessaryxtoxnakexthexprocessxworkxinxeconomicxtermsx process in order to make it economically feasible.

4. Also, we knew, because of previous experiences, that the layout of the houses by the families would work successfully only ifx this operation could take place within a well structured framework. In order to make their efforts and acts effective everybody could we would have to channel and coordinate them, so that wexwould obtain kaxe the best results. Therefore, we introduced a set of rules which described step by step the acts that each family had to undertake in order to accomplish the layout of its house and its contribution to the layout of its house cluster. The set families Thixxxxxxxxirules made would make clear to the family what and exactly they were aiming at on the overall, what specifically they were pursuing at every step of the layout process. Besides on a coherent way this it would make it easier for us to assist them,/ to follow closely their & attempts, and to coordinate their kaxxxxx acts.

and feasibility of the process in economic terms. Although the layout of the houses by the individual families on the site, which had been assessed to take be completed within ten days, was starting to make the process feetberxxxxix feasible, still there was the problem of preparing drawing for twenty different houses to be sumbitted for building permit. Our intention was to record from the site all the house layouts, use them as the final plans for the houses without allowing any further changes from the side of the families and prepare rough drawings, one sheet for every house, plan, and elevations, and one section and submit these as the final drawing for the houses together with a set of construction details the same for all of them.

- g. The houses would be built on the basis on the stakes placed in the ground by the families, on the basis of the drawings, and of a set of construction details and specifications, the same for all the houses.

The degree to which these objectives had been achieved at the end, whether or not all the families shared the same objectives and saw the value in pursuing them, will be discussed later after I present what was the physical outcome of the layout process and the way it was materialized, received and understood by the families.
